Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to prepare students to participate in exercising their political responsibilities as thoughtful and informed citizens. The course will focus on the origins, development, structure, and functions of government in the United States of America. Topics of study include the constitutional framework, federalism, the three branches of government and the federal bureaucracy, civil rights and liberties, political participation, and the political behavior of the American public. While the main focus of the course is on the federal government, additional attention will be paid to state and local governments in Pennsylvania.

Classroom Policies

4. Food and Drink:

- No food will be consumed in the classroom; that is to be done in the cafeteria. Water in a clear bottle or container is acceptable.

5. Absences:

- Make-up work is **your** responsibility!!
- Upon your return to school, check with your teacher(s) for the previous day's work
- You can also access missed work & assignments by logging into Canvas
- School policy states that all work not submitted within two (2) weeks after the due date will be counted as a zero. This will only change when your teacher(s) is/are notified of emergency situations.

6. Bathroom:

- Be responsible and respectful when asking to go to the bathroom (not in the middle of instruction).
- Must sign out to leave the room using e-hallpass

7. Group Work:

- You will be held accountable for assignments & behavior while working in groups
- Always contribute to group work and thoroughly complete your responsibilities.

8. Substitutes:

- You are expected to be on your absolute best behavior if a substitute is here.
- If your name is left on a note by a substitute as a result of an issue, you will *at the least* have a **phone call** home & after-school detention!

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Every student is responsible for keeping a binder, or a section of a binder, which will hold all printed documents

2. Headphones:

- You will need them on a regular basis

3. Laptop:

- You will need your laptop EVERY DAY !!
- Make sure it is CHARGED

GRADING

1. Exams:

- All exams will be announced in advance
- Review guides and/or class time will be provided to prepare for exams
- Test corrections and/or test retakes are available upon request after meeting with your teacher(s). You can earn up to ½ point back per question for test corrections.

2. Projects:

- From time to time, you will be working individually or in groups to complete a project that extends your thinking by researching and creating a product that illustrates your understanding of the content.

5. Discussion Board Posts:

- Discussion posts will be assigned from time to time to reflect on an article or concept to be learned about in class or discussed during the class period.

4. Classwork/Homework:

- It is rare that homework is given other than studying. If used wisely, the allotted class time should be more than sufficient to complete any work.

5. Lateness:

- All work submitted late will be subject to late points corresponding to the number of days late; generally, it is policy that after 7 days, the assignment can only receive half credit.
- All work not received within two weeks after the due date will count as a zero.
